
On March 6 2023, Papua LNG partners TotalEnergies, Santos and Exxon Mobil hosted an important event with government and business community leaders to announce the fully integrated Front-End Engineering Design (FEED) phase of the Project, and the unveiling of the Papua LNG logo.

The logo reflects the rich cultural heritage of the two provinces hosting the Project.

It depicts a crocodile to represent the Gulf province, and the two sails of the Lakatoi to represent the ancient tradition of the Hiri trade between Gulf and Central provinces.

We chose this logo as a reflection of our commitment to the regions that host Papua LNG.



I am pleased to reach out and share important updates and milestones for Papua LNG; especially the fully integrated FEED entry that was celebrated on March 6th. You'll also read how we are increasing our engagement with communities and what will happen later this year.

Productive meetings have occurred through Lida Kibungs and the Gulf Provincial Working Group.

The Community Relations team have begun awareness and roll out of the Village Liaison Officers (VLOs) recruitment, which has now expanded from PRL15 to also include representatives across waterways communities, along the proposed Pipeline Export Route through the Popo inland communities then down to Orokolo coastal communities.

This will mean we have VLOs in every key area so we can regularly engage with communities across the region.

Our Wabo Camp has resumed operations, allowing active engagement with communities in Ura, Wabo'oa and Wabo station. We have renewed and widened our partnership with Kapuna hospital where we also started a solar lamp project. And there will be more projects to come this year, including the construction of classrooms in Wabo and Evara to support the education of the children in the Project area, and preparing for their future.

Independent Advisory Panel

In November 2022 we established an Independent Advisory Panel to provide insights and feedback to Papua LNG on environment protection, biodiversity, human development.

The Panel members are highly reputable professionals and community leaders recognized for their significant experience and steady commitment to make a positive contribution to the people and the country. The Panel's mission is to encourage the Project in its efforts to construct long-term relationships with the local communities and to preserve the environment.

The Panel meets on a quarterly basis. Panel members visited Evara and Kapuna in February this year. Then in April the panel visited Ura, Wabo, Kavava and Kapuna. During each visit, Panel members engage with local communities, hearing open feedback and observations.

Happening on the Purari River in May

Facts about barges



The barge is 70 meters long and 20 meters wide. The barge will travel at a slow and steady pace along the river.

Alongside or in front of the barge, there will be a tug-boat. Tugs are also powered by motors with propellers. Tugs are between 20-25 meters long.

Once it barge has been safely unloaded, it will turn around and travel back down to river to Port Moresby.

Other vessels on the river... What's continuing

- The Komodo vessel will continue to travel up and down the river, carrying people who are working on social or environmental studies and community engagement activities.
- Daily ferry boats will continue to travel between Herd Base and Purari Airstrip.
- The supply boat that carries freight and containers from Port Moresby to Herd Base will continue once to twice a week. They will travel more frequently next year. We will keep you updated.

Why are we beginning barging?

Tugged barges have already been used occasionally for some specific loads. This traffic will increase as part of the preparatory works, even ahead of the full launching of the Project. Therefore we undertook a barge trial in May to get a better idea of the constraints related to the movements of those aggregates loaded barges along the Purari river. We also want the local communities to see with their own eyes what those barges and tugs look like.

The barge travelled up the Purari Aivei River to Herd Base, to be safely unloaded.

What's on the barges?

The barge will carry aggregates which are small, dense rocks made by crushing larger rocks to the required size and shape. Some of this gravel is available in the Project area, and all efforts are done to maximize the use of this local material. But a complement as low as possible will have to be shipped from licenced quarries in Port Moresby area, where more quantities of higher grade is available.

The aggregate is used to consolidate the roads required between the different Project units (wells, upstream process plant (CPF, logistic base), and the platforms where those units will be built.

Safety on the river

Strong and consistent safety is our ongoing commitment! We want to make sure you're safe and we also want the boats and passengers to be safe too.

- The barge will have a person who stands at the front to look out for people swimming in the river, fishing, travelling in canoes, washing or any other activity.
- The barge will only travel at slow and steady speed. The person standing at the front of the boat will tell the boat driver to further slow-down when they see someone in the water.
- As an extra safety measure, there will be a 'multi-cat' boat. This boat will be ahead of the tug and barge. It will spot and clear logs and other debris and maintain a good communication with local communities.


Government representatives also shared their priorities and activities.


Discussions with community leaders

The fifth PRL-15 Lida Kibung meeting was held in Poroi 2 on May 18th 2022. This outcome was the first since the Project went into Care & Maintenance phase early 2020.

The event was well attended by the local communities; 56 people represented seven communities. The group included both men and women community leaders, rising youth leaders, clan leaders, church leadership, local ward councilors plus school and health committee representatives.



The sixth Lida Kibung was held in Evara on May 10th, 2023. It was a good opportunity for the Project team to connect and engage with the representatives of the PRL-15 communities. Together with the community we discussed areas of local interest and heard issues and opportunities.

Village Liaison Officer program to expand in Project area communities

Our Community Relations team maintains high level of focused on ensuring regular dialogue and consultation with communities across Project areas.

Initially implemented in 2018, the Village Liaison Officer (VLO) program originally targeted communities around the PRL- 15 area; Wabo, Subu, Poroi 2, Kaevaria and Evara.

The VLO program is now expanding to communities along the Purari River. This includes villages in the Purari Aivei tributary at Aivai,

Aumu and Apiope. The VLO program is also expanding to communities along the Pipeline Export Route to the Popo inland region, Muro area and down to the Orokolo on the coast.

Awareness for the roll out happened from February 27th to March 19th 2023, covering 27 communities.

Meanwhile the selection process is being finalized, and 20 new VLOs are being nominated.

Update on SMLI Report submission to DPE

The Social Mapping Landowner Identification (SMLI) was completed early 2020. SMLIs then submitted to the Department of Petroleum (DPE) in July 2022 and September 2022.

DPE contracted an independent peer review of the SMLIs late 2022.

DPE will soon begin the Landowner Beneficiary Identification (Lobid) program.

Land Owner Identification and Development Forum Planning

The Government owns and manages the Lobid process. It sets the timing, process, locations and who is involved. A one-week Lobid location scoping was undertaken by DPE in mid-April. The actual Lobid should be finalized by end of May 2023.

The purpose of the Lobid is for DPE to confirm the villages, clans & landowners. This will

help the Minister to determine the Project beneficiaries, in line with the section 169A of the Oil and gas Act, who will later be invited to the Development Forum.

This forum will take place over a two-to-three-week period. At the Forum, landowners, the local-level government and the Provincial Governments of the Project host areas will discuss sharing benefits with national government representatives.

The confirmed landowners are then invited to participate in the Development Forum. This is where the National Government through various key economic departments, meet with the beneficiaries to discuss and agree to the percentages to be shared.

The State is responsible for the organization of the different steps leading to the Development Forum. DPE teams will be in liaison with the local communities during this period from Lobid to Development Forum.



Community Development Initiatives

Bridging the learning gap

Papua LNG signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with LiteHaus International in February 2023 to build literacy skills in young people.

The MoU includes support for 11 schools within the PRL 15 region, inland along the pipeline route and along the Purari River. 300 primary school students will have access to new learning tools.

87 laptops and 11 workstations have also been donated, which will be re-furnished by LiteHaus. The laptops and workstations will help build the digital capacity of the targeted schools in the most remote parts of the province.

Workforce development

Scholarships available to students in Gulf province

We value skill development that leads to work opportunities. That's why the Project has established a TVET scholarship program to help young people build knowledge and practical competency to achieve recognized qualifications in various sectors, for example mechanical fitting, building and construction.

In 2019 TotalEnergies PNG signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with Port Moresby Technical College to provide scholarships to young people coming from the Gulf Province. In March this year we again signed a further agreement to continue the Scholarship Program, and we extended it to other regions.

To date more than 171 students enrolled in various trade courses, with 71 completing their National Certificate (NC) in 2021. Two of these

students are currently working on the Papua LNG Project and one at the Kapuna hospital.

49 students graduated with a NC2 in April this year and are now preparing for NC3. 17 students will begin this coming June. Earlier this year 53 students enrolled in the NC1 Scholarship Program.

We actively promote women joining the Scholarship Program, and welcome 12 female students amongst the 53-student 2023 cohort.

In November 2022, Papua LNG signed a further Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with Gulf Christian Services in Kapuna. The MoU will provide health and education programs in Kapuna Rural Hospital. We are pleased to continue this long-standing partnership to assist the region build health, education and capacity building which has sustainable benefits.

The MoU includes logistics support, health patrols, tuberculosis programs, the renovation of male dormitories plus a new mess and sanitation facilities for Kapuna Community Health Workers Training School and capacity building for Kapuna primary school teachers.




About Papua LNG project

Papua LNG is a liquefied natural gas (LNG) production project led by TotalEnergies in response to Papua New Guinea's desire to develop its gas resources. There have been estimated at over 1 billion barrels of oil equivalent. The Project will have an LNG export volume of 5.6 million tonnes per year (Mt/y).

The Project is a direct response to the growing need for energy in the Asia Market, which will contribute greatly to the economic growth of Papua New Guinea, focusing on people development. It is also a landmark project, in terms of sustainability, carbon footprint optimisation and biodiversity consideration.
